Jim Miner

Program on July 25 was a presentation by Jim Miner. Jim is a real estate broker in the city and formerly a teacher in the **Rochester Schools.**

He described the housing supply and needs in this area.

Mostly he skimmed the issues related to our housing as it is, its needs, costs, and where we are currently. Here are a few of the items:

- Cost of new construction is high
- Labor cost is high and rising
- Codes imposed by the city are costing \geq more
- \geq Inflation
- Fees such as connections, sidewalks, streets, etc.
- Buyer's requests for the options in the new construction
- Profits for the developers are high

Apartments are being built because of lack of single family homes in a price range that people can afford. Condos and townhouses are a part of the same phenomenon.

The few lots in Rochester available for single family units are very limited. Jim says when these are available the lot will cost 50-75 thousand for property alone. He says a downtown complex is in the works and will be 'High' and 'Expensive'.

Jim has organized a couple of sheets with many statistics that he keeps current. Anyone can request him to put you on his email list for the latest compilation.

He points out that home ownership has traditionally been the major asset in ones net worth. He feels that wages 'must' increase if that tradition is to be maintained. How important is it to you? Are the alternative housing methods going to fulfill your needs?
